NEW PARISH COUNCILLOR Councillor Ant Reid



I decided to join the Parish Council after observing it for nearly two years - many of you will have seen my blog and know I've been watching and reporting. The time has come for me to get directly involved with how and why parish decisions are made, and I feel I can help the council by bringing new perspectives and experiences. Having seen some decisions go really well and others flounder and stall, or cause negative reactions, I hope that by becoming part of the conversation I can help shape those decisions to be more robust when implemented. In addition, my experience in the world of digital solutions and content research will help speed up the process of taking ideas from concept to delivery - for example by anticipating risks and issues so we can seek advice from specialists beforehand and build a better plan.

I am a recent convert to the concept of 'failing fast' - how to spot when something is going wrong and to quickly shut it down and move on. All to often public projects seem to 'fail slowly', and I hope that in a small way I can help Eccleshall Parish Council to spot such things early enough to put them right - or abandon bad ideas promptly!

Becoming a Parish Councillor

Members of the public are welcome to attend and observe council meetings, and can address the members of the council during the *Public Participation* section of the meeting.

Parish Council Elections take place every four years, with the next election taking place in May 2023.

Each year, the parish holds a public meeting so that the members of the community can be informed about the activities of their council and enable them to ask questions.

Due to the Pandemic restrictions it was not as easy as it usually would be.

This year a smaller version of the meeting was held virtually using Zoom technology to enable all of the councillors and members of the public who wished to be involved in the process, with a view to inviting community representatives to a face to face meeting when appropriate to do so.

He has had a wide experience having worked both as a Practice Pharmacist and also as a member of the South Staffs Professional Executive committee of the local Primary Care Group.

Despite having health issues following a stroke in 2011, he continued to work albeit reduced hours at least 3 days a week.

After 39 years as a pharmacist, 29 of them being in Eccleshall, he feels it is the right time to pass the baton on to another to continue the work.

He is married to Julie, has 3 adult children and is now a grandparent to Samuel, with whom he intends spending more of his free time.

The Keep Eccleshall Tidy (KET) team have been very busy keeping our pavements, seats and signposts clean and tidy. It is also excellent that so many of the team have pledged at least 2 hours to 'The Great British Spring Clean', a nationwide campaign that started on the 29 May and finished on the 13 June. The KET team pledged 74 a total of hours. This equates to 222 miles (3 miles per hour). Thank you to all the team for all the work they have done, not just over the past two week period, but also since August 2020 when the KET team was first formed.

On a slightly negative note, Eccleshall still has an issue with cigarette butts. These can be found particularly along both sides of the High Street and on the Co-op side of Stafford Street. There are bins readily available into which extinguished butts can be placed and we would urge people to use them when throwing away cigarette ends. Picking up cigarette butts with the litter picking sticks is a challenge and the KET team often have to resort to picking them up by hand. This really isn't fair as it would be so easy for smokers to place them in the nearby bins.

We currently have 14 year old, Murron NcNellan, litter picking for a three month period for an hour a week, to complete the community section of the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award. The Parish Council are very keen to help in any way with this excellent scheme and would welcome any young person to the KET team who is working towards this award. We also wish mention 15 year old Jackson Atkins who undertook the Captain Sir Tom Moore Challenge of 100 at the end of April. Jackson picked up 100+ littered items in The Dells. We are so fortunate to have some fantastic young people in our community as the photographs show.

As you can see from these photographs the Parish Council welcome residents of all ages to our wonderful KET team. Litter picking can take place in family groups, couples, individually, with your dog and even in the rain. We would welcome volunteers to our very important community minded team.

Partners in Parking

In recent surveys of the opinion of the residents of the area, more parking often comes top of the list of things that people want.

In many towns these days finding a convenient parking place is not always easy. We like to park next to the shop that we want to visit and have got used to out of town stores with masses of parking. Eccleshall has a wide variety of town centre businesses that are well worth a visit.

Part of the solution for Eccleshall town centre without its own large shoppers car park was partially solved when the Central England Co-op built the current store and provided it with a large car park.

Shoppers can park free for up to two hours.

The problem for staff who worked in the town centre was not so easily solved. After the free two hours there is a charge for any additional time.

In cooperation with the Co-op,

Eccleshall Parish Council arranged for ten parking spaces in the Adopt-atrader scheme which allowed ten traders one space each for their staff without charge.

The spaces are much sought after and the scheme relies on traders to make full use of them. Until the Police Post was sold Councillor Jeremy Part had arranged thirteen spaces on their car park. Of course with the sale of the Police Post the spaces were no longer available. The search for more spaces continues and traders are encouraged to use out of town centre streets for parking, leaving the town centre for shoppers and visitors.

Eccleshall, as everyone knows, lies mostly in the valley of the River Sow. As a consequence, surface water from housing and roads makes its way through the drainage system into the river, and at times of extreme weather this cannot cope with the flow, resulting in flooding, as seen on Stone Road and the town centre. Housing developments over the last 30 or so years have put a further load on the drainage system (part of which is c100 years old), and in recent times, properties and businesses have sustained serious flood damage.

Eccleshall Flood Action Group was formed, with the help of the National Flood Forum to identify flood risks within our community, and outlying villages within the Parish, i.e. Slindon which has been affected recently. EFLAG membership consists of local residents, some who have experienced flooding first hand, and Parish, Borough and County Councillors. **EFLAG** has given advice to other local flood victims, and also obtained grants for the fitting of flood door barriers in the Stafford Street /High Street area . EFLAG is constantly monitoring proposed building development in the area, and the adverse effect it may have on the situation. The work on Stone Road to alleviate flooding by installing additional pipework is ongoing at the time of writing, and should have a considerable effect on reducing the threat to property on this stretch of the highway.



In addition, EFLAG is working with various agencies i.e. Staffordshire County Council Flood Risk Team, the Environment Agency, Severn Trent Water, Staffordshire Highways, Sow and Penk Internal Drainage Board and the Staffordshire Wildlife Trust, and is also working to improve the reporting procedure of floods as they occur, to the appropriate bodies.

It has been observed in recent years, that standing water is present on fields and other open spaces, which may indicate that ditches are not fulfilling their function in carrying water away efficiently, resulting in flooding of roads and property.

EFLAG have managed to hold meetings through the latter stages of the Pandemic via Zoom, including a successful 'open forum' attended by numerous residents and outside agencies. A Facebook page was set up in February, and has proved a popular method of communication. It is anticipated as Covid 19 restrictions are eased and we move into the Summer months, the Group will be able to carry out more practical work 'in the field' i.e. physical inspection and reporting of obstructed ditches and drainage to the appropriate landowners and agencies.

TREE FELLAS AND THREE LADIES

The overall effect of their work creates a wonderfully sunny outlook to the town centre for many months. The brackets used are tested to ensure that the baskets are secure and in no way endanger the passing public. Prior to this date, volunteers from Amey (Staffordshire County Council contractors) kindly gave their time to install 8 ground anchors for replacement oak posts. The approved new fitting aims to reduce rotting of the oak posts, which was the cause of the replacements.



The Ecclian Society raises the funds each year to pay for the baskets and mangers, many of them are sponsored by local businesses, individuals and organisations, whose support is then acknowledged with a plaque on or near the baskets and mangers. The baskets were obtained from Johnson Hall Nursery.

Watering of the baskets is paid for by Eccleshall Parish Council.



The Society is also responsible for the erection of the Christmas trees complete with lights in the town centre using the same brackets after the baskets have been taken down.

HIDDEN TREASURE?

Hidden away on Shaws Lane in
Eccleshall is the Allotment
Association's 65 plot site.
Although it has been there for over
40 years the location of it is still a
mystery to many residents.

The five acre site is owned by the Parish Council and is managed and operated by the Allotment Association.

The folk who look after a plot ranges from 80 year olds to youngsters and the success rate for growth varies along with the produce grown. If you fancy your chances get in touch with the association for further details. There is currently a short waiting list, and any plots that become free will be allocated in turn, at a modest annual rent.

PARISH FOOTPATHS

The Footpath Marshals have been hard at work walking their allocation of parish footpaths and reporting issues they have found. This has been especially relevant as the verges and hedgerows have been growing very fast recently. Our Footpaths Maintenance Operative has been dealing with all the issues as they have been reported. The Parish Council is grateful for all the time that the Footpath Marshal team give to this activity.

It is still hoped that we shall be able to convene a stile building team at the end of July. The team will be made up of 3 or 4 volunteers who will be supervised by an employee of the County Council and will completely build and replace stiles that can no longer be repaired.

You may have seen signs, placed on posts by some fields by the NFU. The Parish Council wish to emphasize the concern felt by farmers whose animals are in the fields, about keeping dogs on leads, unless you are chased by cattle, in which case release your dog as the cattle are more likely to chase the dog.

Several residents have expressed concern about the growth of vegetation on footpath 13 that runs from Shaws Lane to the Vicarage end of the Eyeswell (footpath 15). As a public right of way the Parish Council do not have a duty to maintain this particular path. The responsibility ultimately lies with the respective landowners that own the land that the path crosses, and the statutory duty to ensure access lies with the County Council. A large section at the top end (Shaws Lane) of the path is on land owned by Taylor Wimpey. However, since this is a well used route within the parish the Parish Council do fund three cut backs of the vegetation each year to support accessibility of the path, although it is not obliged to do so. The Parish Council is also currently looking to replace the metal gate where footpath 13 intersects with the Eyeswell end of the path, as this gate is corroding.

Some residents have also commented about dog fouling on the Eyeswell (footpath 15). This, again, is a very well used path and it is important to keep it clear for all to enjoy. If you regularly walk along this path with your dog, please be kind enough to pick up any excrement left by your dog. There is a bin at the top of Small Lane, one on Usulwall Close and one at the Vicarage end on the Washpits.
